

Nursing Facility Transition services are available to residents of nursing facilities who would like to return to their own home, move in with family members, find an apartment, or choose another housing option.



Supports and services needed after an individual moves back home may be available to those who meet functional and financial guidelines. If a person does not meet these guidelines, efforts will be made to identify community resources to address the individual's needs.

Surveys to evaluate Quality of Life will be conducted after transitioning.

Nursing Facility Transition Services

Money Follows the Person



The goal of nursing facility transition services and the Money Follows the Person program are to provide nursing facility residents with the chance to move back into the community if they so desire.

The Transition Process:

Referral:

Nursing facility residents may request transition services for themselves, or a referral for services may be made by any concerned individual such as a family member, friend, or a social worker.

Interview:

An initial interview will be conducted to obtain information necessary to begin the process. You will also be asked to sign an informed consent form.



At this time additional information about the transition process will be provided.

Assistance:

A transition coordinator will be assigned to help you throughout the transition process.

Plan Development:

A person-centered plan will be developed by you and the transition coordinator, with help from family members and friends you choose. The transition process may take several months to ensure a safe and successful return to the community.



Housing:

Help is available to adapt your home or to find affordable, accessible housing if you don't have a place to live in the community.

Transition Services:

Assistance is available for some one-time moving expenses such as a security or utility deposit, housekeeping supplies, or essential furniture.

Support Services:

Your transition coordinator will help you secure the supports and services you need so you can live independently in the community as long as possible.



Typical services include: personal care, home delivered meals, transportation, private duty nursing, housekeeping, and supports coordination.

You can stop the transition process at any time without penalty.
